




At 8 years old, Evan appears to be your typical kid. He loves LEGOS, reading, puzzles, and running cross country. Five years ago however, this was not the Evan that most people knew. Evan's mom Kelly became concerned when her son was not reaching his speech milestones like his peers. After being told not to worry, "he's just a boy," Kelly decided to take matters into her own hands.

The board began helping Evan in 2011 work toward his reading and speaking goals. At age 3 ½, Evan said "Mom" for the very first time. "All of the sudden it clicked for him," Kelly said.

Now, Evan helps his teachers with students in his class who are struggling with reading. He teaches them how to use inflection in

their voice when reading aloud. At the end of his third grade year, Evan tested into the gifted science class and was one point away from testing into gifted math. "If Evan had not had services so early on, he may not have made such progress and be thriving at such an early age. I can't say enough about what Early Intervention has done for Evan," said Kelly.

The Nancy Richards Self-Advocate Award

The Nancy Richards Self-Advocate Award is presented annually to a person with a disability who effectively advocates for himself or herself.

Ashley was nominated by Susan Cornett and Marcia Wasielewski. In her nomination, Susan talked about how Ashley has grown tremendously as a leader who advocates for others and herself. She is currently the president of the Kiwanis Aktion Club and represented the local chapter at the Kiwanis International Convention in Indianapolis.

Marcia shared that she has had the pleasure of working with Ashley for many years. Ashley is an avid volunteer at Willowbrook by Day and has volunteered over 2,000 hours at Grady Memorial Hospital.

Ashley also formed "Team Nanna" which has raised over \$3,000 for the annual Alzheimer's walk. Ashley summed up what self-advocacy meant to her when she said: "I have a 'hidden disability.' You cannot see what I need. You will see that I am very independent, talkative, fun, loving, and helpful. What you don't see is that I do need help and attention. I need you to listen to me, respect me, and help me when I need it." Representing all elements of a true self-advocate, Ashley is very deserving of The Nancy Richards Self-Advocate Award.
